The Summer Program for Verbally and mathematically Precocious Youth (VAMPY) is a three-week residential summer program for very bright students on the campus of Western Kentucky University. VAMPY is designed to provide a balance of educational, cultural, and recreational

experiences for high-ability seventh through tenth graders.

Learning at VAMPY is conducted in a fast-paced, challenging format. Classes meet six hours each weekday and are taught by outstanding teachers who incorporate a variety of projects, field trips, and lectures into their curriculum. Class size is limited to 16 students, and learning experiences are planned to be appropriate for highability students. Class options vary from year to year but always cover a wide range of academic disciplines, ranging from humanities to chemistry, political science, physics, history, mathematics, and more.

In the evenings and on weekends, residential counselors plan a variety of cultural, educational, and recreational activities which include cookouts. dances, and a talent show as well as individual and team sports, games, and creative adventures. There are many opportunities for campers to enjoy getting to know young people with similar abilities and interests.

To be eligible to attend VAMPY, students must earn the requisite ACT or SAT scores specific to their course selection. Requirements are based on individual subject scores relative to the topic of the course, not composite scores, and, therefore, vary from course to course. It is recommended that students take the ACT or SAT in the fall or winter to allow time for scores to be processed. VAMPY applications, which include the course options and score requirements, are available mid-winter.

For gifted students who have completed sixth, seventh, or eighth grade, The Summer Camp for Academically Talented Middle School Students (SCATS) presents a unique learning environment to explore new ideas, develop concepts, make

> friends, and share experiences.

SCATS provides a diverse curriculum and a wide range of enrichment experiences for about 200 middle school students every summer. A two-week

program, SCATS provides both residential and nonresidential options. Nonresidential students attend classes and return home in the afternoon. Residential campers live in a residence hall on WKU's campus.

With almost 30 different course options ranging from arts and humanities to mathematics and sciences, students are placed in four of their top ten choices and

Saturday classes allow high-ability and highinterest students in grades one through eight to broaden the scope of their interests and interact with other bright young people on WKU's campus or at the Kentucky Science Center in Louisville.

In small classes, students explore an area of interest with a teacher who has expertise in that field. The classes emphasize a

hands-on, minds-on approach to learning in an environment in which creative and critical thinking are encouraged.

Classes meet for two and a half hours on four consecutive Saturdays. Sessions are offered in both the fall and winter.



Camp Explore Grades 1-3 Camp Innovate

Camp Explore and Camp Innovate are week-long day camps designed for high ability and high interest children. The experience features hands-on and mindson instruction to engage children in learning at advanced

levels. Students explore a wide range of subjects ranging from math and science to art and language arts. The camps are held during separate weeks at WKU.
